

PARISH COUNCIL MATTERS

A new Parish Council will be formed following the election on $4^{\rm th}$ May. The boundary of the area that our Parish Council will be responsible for will change, as shown on the map below, to cover Tyttenhanger, Smallford, Sleapshyde, and Colney Heath village.

The Parish Council will have six Councillors for Colney Heath ward with we understand 1,952 electors covering Smallford, Sleapshyde, and Colney Heath village – and Tyttenhanger ward with have one Councillor for 162 electors.


Nominations for candidates wishing to stand for election opened on 20^{th} March and close at 4pm on 4^{th} April. St Albans District Council, will announce the accepted candidates on 5^{th} April.

If there are more than 6 candidates in Colney Heath ward, or more than one in Tyttenhanger ward, there will be a ballot and electors will have the opportunity to vote for the candidates they favour.

If there are 6 or fewer candidates in Colney Heath ward, or only one in Tyttenhanger ward, they will be "elected unopposed" and no ballot will be held.

Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers donating their time and effort. The Parish Council is responsible for various basic services that are the closest to residents. These include open spaces including the Colney Heath Common, Parish-owned buildings and land and play areas at Roestock, Tyttenhanger & Sleapshyde, and noticeboards, bus shelters, dog waste bins and litter bins. The Parish Council assists residents with matters that are the responsibility of other authorities such as the District and County Council and is a statutory consultee on planning applications, a very important function and especially so now with the various planning applications for multidwelling housing developments.

Another important function is the neighbourhood plan which the Parish Council is creating on behalf of the community.



DERRICK CRUMP'S LETTER TO THE EDITORS

Many thanks for the latest edition of the Coal Post and the succinct summary of the issues and opportunities facing a new Parish Council in 2023.

Regarding the reference to the 'John Dean Affair' you are correct in stating that the 2021 CHPC 'Report in the Public Interest concerning the Parish Council's governance and ultravires payments April 2004 – July 2015' inferred that more than £100,000 of cash had not been accounted for.

The actual statement on page 6 of the report was as follows;

'Over £100,000 was taken from the NatWest bank account in **petty cash**. Most were signed with the cheque photocopied on the back of the payment approval sheet but there are no records of what this money was used for.'

I find it unfortunate that the PIR (Public Interest Report) is now quoted without reference to subsequent clarification that identifies inaccuracies contained therein, particularly when demonstrated through Freedom of Information (FOI) responses on the CHPC web site.

I appreciate that there are many FOI responses on the site and therefore in order to support my comment I have extracted a few of the key points regarding the stated 'over £100,000 taken from the NatWest bank account'.

'As petty cash was not 'withdrawn' the following amounts have been taken from all cheques made payable to the former Parish Clerk which were either marked or noted as 'cash', 'petty cash' or simply marked with his name.'

The response stated that 301 cheque payments were made to the clerk totalling £75,510.95, and records for 5 (of the 11.33) years are described as incomplete.

It would be interesting to know how the figure of £100.000 was calculated given the published (FOI) data (was an assumption made for years with incomplete data?).

More significant in my view is clarification in this FOI response that the £75,510.95 comprised cheques 'made payable to the former Parish Clerk which were either marked or noted as 'cash', 'petty cash' or simply marked with his name.

It is apparent therefore that the £75,510.95 was not only composed of payments 'marked or noted' as for petty cash (to maintain the petty cash float). A further CHPC FOI response dated 4th February 2022 shows that in one example year (2011/12) only 4 of the 37 cheques payable to John Dean were recorded on cheque stubs as being for petty cash.

The FOI response also includes the statement concerning cheques payable to John Dean that 'the cheque stubs which are held do not include expenditure reason.'

A subsequent CHPC FOI response of 8th March 2022 makes the following statement concerning the example year of 2011/12; 'Council agree that the number of cheques they have identified from cheque stubs as payment for petty cash in 2011/12 is four and their total value is £955.27 which represents 13% of the total value of the 37 cheques they identify as payable to Mr Dean.'

The FOI response of 8th March 2022 then makes clear that the historic records held by the Council when preparing the PIR (Public Interest Report) did not include important Council documents that were circulated at every parish council meeting at that time and were available to any member of the public attending (or by request subsequently);

DERRICK CRUMP'S LETTER TO THE EDITORS

'The Parish Council do not hold the 'Report of payments' documents (known as 'pink sheets') that were presented to full Council meetings in financial year 2011/12 by the late clerk Mr J Dean (along with payment approval cover sheets and supporting invoices/receipts) and were the subject of full Council resolution to approve payments and included a description of the purpose of payments, including that of topping up the petty cash float.'

It should be realised that 2011/12 is just an example year from the 11.33 years of interest and that the process of approval of payment of all cheques at full council meetings was standard practice throughout the whole period that John Dean was clerk.

Cheques made payable to Mr J Dean (other than for wages) were for reimbursement for payments of goods and services approved by Council. All payments were supported by receipts for such goods and services.

This system of reimbursement was necessary because the only means of payment available to Council was a cheque signed by the clerk and two authorised signatories. This was adequate for payment of invoices but not practical for goods and services where payment was required at the time of receipt of goods e.g., in a supermarket or other retailer.

Council did not have a credit or debit card. Small items could be purchased in cash using the petty cash float but this was kept at a level of the order of a couple of hundred pounds because of the security risk posed by cash in the office.

It is in my view apparent that at the time of writing the PIR there were no records of what the '£100,000' taken from the Nat West bank account in 'petty cash' was used for because the most relevant historic records (i.e., pink payment sheets/ financial reports approved by full Council) have apparently been lost or mislaid. Indeed, it would appear that the surviving incomplete records (i.e., cheque stubs) held by the Council indicate that only a minor proportion of those cash payments was for 'petty cash'.

I have also pointed out to Council (by means of a letter dated 10/02/2022) that all petty cash expenditure was the subject of audited records. Examination of the available internal audit reports on the CHPC web site e.g., for 2014/15, refers to these records of petty cash transactions.

We would not be surprised if we see applications for sites 4 and 5 in due course.

Not shown on this map is Tarmac's application for 45 houses next to the Football Club which may be the "catflap entrance" to 700+ houses along the A414 from the school to the A1M.

The Tarmac, Vistry and Bellway applications have all passed the 8 week deadline for the District Council to give their decision, in part because the applicants have submitted further information extending the time for the decision.

Some residents are wondering if the developers and the District Council are "working together" on a plan to develop our little village into a much bigger "dormitory unsettlement" to be sprung upon us after the election in May.

MAKE YOUR VIEWS KNOWN ON MANOR GARDEN PARK

Dear Resident,

We are very sorry to notify you of yet more worrying news for Colney Heath village. Mr Ryan Franklin-Smith, the landowner who lives in Roundhouse Farm, has recently circulated an email to some local residents announcing his plan to build on land behind his house (the fields adjacent to Roestock Lane and opposite Roestock Gardens – currently where the sheep graze). This application was submitted to St Albans District Council on 28th February, but without full details or architectural drawings.

Called Manor Garden Park, it is being promoted in partnership with The Fairliving Foundation as a 'residential care home with key worker housing'. However it's really a new housing estate that features residential care as one element of it. Yes it does offer something different, however our big concern is that if it does not work out economically on paper, it could all change. That could mean many more homes being built – mostly unaffordable to key workers – and once again, on Green Belt farmland.

Mr Franklin-Smith has already held 'consultations' with local residents where he has openly stated that he only wants what's best for the Village and will listen to residents' views. He has said that if there is a consensus not to build Manor Garden Park, he won't. If you are concerned about Manor Garden Park and the effect it will have on the Village, can you please sign the online petition at the address below. This will then be sent to Mr Franklin-Smith so that he can understand the full opposition of residents to his plans (you'll be able to submit your views about Manor Garden Park to St Albans District Council once the application goes 'live' in the next few weeks).

We say, let's hold Mr Franklin-Smith to his word. If he is a man of integrity, then, as he has said, he must listen to residents and what they want for their village – not what he wants!

Chairman's Comments by Richard Smith

We are delighted to be able to contribute to the Coal Post for this Spring 2023 issue. As chairman of a large organisation in a small village, I am aware of the responsibility of the football club to serve the interests of the people of Colney Heath just as much as it is to provide adult and youth football in a safe and supportive environment on our pitches. In the pages below we are happy to report on the various teams, fixtures, and events on the pitch, and to inform readers about our social events in the pavilion and recreational areas.

Not everyone is interested in football, we understand that, and know that the pavilion nevertheless has an important function in the village. We can let it out for parties and events, and occasionally have live music or guest speakers for members and non-members alike. It can also be used for clubs and hobby-groups if the timings work out.

Last year during the Queen's Jubilee our social team put on two full days of community-facing events, and it was delightful to see so many people enjoying the family entertainment which included bingo, sing-a-longs and inflatable toys. We are hoping for similar engagement with the upcoming coronation of King Charles this year.

The Coal Post is a good opportunity to remind all in the vicinity of the defibrillator that is housed on the outside wall of the clubhouse. This has been called-upon and applied in life-threatening situations on two occasions since installation eight years ago.

We hope you never have need to use it, but if you do then you can be assured that it is readily accessible to anyone, and we will have it re-charged with new pads and electrodes within days after each use.

My ambition is to see the football club playing an ever more positive role within Colney Heath. For example, litter in our village is too often visible, and my hope is that we can co-ordinate and supply a litter-picking team from the Recreation Ground. We will meet fortnightly (Saturday mornings perhaps) and pick litter around the parish for an hour or so before returning for complimentary tea/coffee and biscuits. Please email me if you would like to be part of this team.

Finally, I would like to thank you for reading these words. Football, like life, is a mirror reflecting the eyes that view it. If you look to see hostility, tribalism, and intolerance you will find it easily enough in football. But by the same token if you look for sportsmanship, fraternity, equality, and the extraordinary achievements that can made possible through commitment, dedication, and teamwork you will find that too, and in abundance.

I have met some amazingly inspiring people through being associated with football. Of course, the game of football itself is ultimately rather futile – every match starts 0-0 and there'll likely be another one next week.

But it is no more futile than social media, reality TV, the stock exchange or war. And indeed, it does far less harm and makes people a good deal healthier too.

Senior Football

We are not enjoying a great season in the Spartan South Midlands Premier Division, and currently reside in the bottom five of the table. It has been a tough transition back to non-league step 5, having enjoyed a season at step 4 in the Southern League in 2021/22.

Results and performances have been picking up recently and manager George Georgiou is working hard to keep us in the division. Since he joined in November last year George has had a solid vision of how he wants to play, based on his own footballing experience with Fulham, Dagenham and Redbridge, Purfleet and playing in Cyprus.

In addition to the senior teams, Colney Heath FC are fielding an U23 Development team in the Herts Senior County League, and an U18 team in the Southern Counties Football League.

We have Ladies teams in the Eastern Region Women's Football League competing against clubs the size of Luton, Bedford, Kings Lynn and Stevenage FC; and also in the Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire Women's Football League.

Positions available


<u>Paid positions</u> – Casual bar staff required. Over 18s only, previous experience would be useful but not essential.

Ready access to a local defibrillator is the single most significant factor that determines chances of surviving a cardiac arrest. We round off on Sunday afternoons with dog training by A Different Dog.

In addition to our regulars we have one-off bookings for a variety of hirers such as First Aid Training, music classes, group meetings such as the 4ColneyHeath Residents Association, public meetings and exhibitions, and periodically elections.

Saturday party time

The DS Achieve Youth Club will be leaving us after Easter. This means Saturday afternoons are again available for parties, especially popular for children's birthday parties, a function the trustees feel is important for local residents.

Friday and Saturday nights are usually available for suitable adult parties.

The village hall is very competitively priced and we believe we offer excellent value for money.

Quality facilities

Over the last 6 years we have made a number of improvements modernizing our kitchen, toilets, and the Studio (previously known as the Community Room). We have upgraded the lighting to LEDs throughout, just before our electricity charges went stratospheric (as a "commercial" customer we don't benefit from the domestic cap).

In addition to the many regular maintenance jobs, we have refurbished the flat roof over the porch. We have more improvements planned for 2023.

KEEPING YOU INFORMED



Judging by the mountains of items contributed it seems lockdown was an opportunity to clear out those cupboards, drawers and the loft.


Almost 100 eager shoppers surged through the doors making this one of the most successful jumble sale we had held. And after shopping many enjoyed tea and cakes provided by the WI.






Improving the Environment around Smallford Station

Refurbishing our Goods Van Body

To date, we have fitted a sturdy, steel reinforcing girder to the base of our Goods Van Body (to ensure that it can withstand being transported) and fitted a new, waterproof roof.



Over the Easter week, a small group of us will be -

- Removing all the remaining old steel bolts holding the plywood walls in place.
- Cleaning the metal framework, applying rust converter and painting it in its period colour -'Goods Van Bauxite'.
- Replacing the plywood sides which will also be painted 'Goods Van Bauxite'.
- Repairing the damaged end ventilator.

There will still be plenty of work to do, including –

- Designing and building a mounting frame and floor
- Fabricating and fitting the doors and locks.
- Furnishing and painting the interior: we hope that Carpentry students from Oaklands College will be involved in fitting out the interior.

Once all the above has been completed, the Goods Van Body will be moved to Smallford Station Car Park where it will be sited next to the platform. It will hold part of our exhibition illustrating the history of the station and the Hatfield & St Albans Railway that it served, together with a selection of our collection of artefacts. We then plan to open this to the public on various occasions throughout the year.

Rewilding the Embankment at Smallford Station

Early in February Hilary Brazier, Derrick Crump and I planted a new hedgerow at the top of the embankment to help screen the area from passing traffic. The young plants were generously donated to us by St Albans District Council.



We're now planning to design, build and erect an information board at the foot of the embankment, explaining the rewilding project, including photos of the work undertaken, and images of many of the indigenous flowers that have been planted so that visitors can identify them. Again, we are hoping that Oaklands College students, from their Art & Design and Carpentry Departments, will be involved.


